


Flagship Programs



Arts Access

We are a collaborative organization by design. In addition to offering our five flagship programs, we connect vulnerable youth to high-quality art-based programs in Charlotte. We identify programs that match each child's interests, foster their creativity, and deepen their community connections. During 2020, TAEP provided 10 students with scholarships to participate in performing and visual arts lessons. Students safely enjoyed virtual and/or socially distant dancing and tumbling lessons at Fuzion Force, and voice and piano lessons with Arts Plus for a total of over 100 hours of high-quality arts engagement.

Free Art Friday

The Arts Empowerment Project brings complimentary art experiences to to the youth ages 5-17 at Safe Alliance and the Youth Learning Center at the YWCA of the Central Carolinas. Visiting artists, funded by TAEP, work with students on art projects that promote character development, social and emotional learning, and literacy through the arts. Throughout the year, students also have many opportunities to attend local theatrical performances and participate in cultural enrichment programs.

Flagship Programs



Promoting Peace + Justice

Our Promoting Peace + Justice classes bring teens at-risk for court involvement together with members of local law enforcement to help break down stereotypes and explore implicit bias and social justice issues through collaborative art. Our team members, teaching artists, and guest speakers from a wide range of disciplines help provide a safe space for officers and teens to engage in honest discussions about community and racially motivated violence, and other challenging topics.

In December 2020, students created abstract self-portraits using collograph print-making techniques taught by Arts Plus. Spoken word artists also led youth in a poetry activity to explore identity, conflict, and a way forward. During the final session, youth participated in a round-table discussion about community and police relations with artists, community members, law enforcement officers, and social workers.

I try to smile even when it hurts



Outreach Programs



Encounters

In our inaugural pivot to virtual programming, TAEP partnered with 9189 Creative Services to present our first Encounters series to youth from Youth and Family Services' Independent Living program. Teens participated in six workshops with local artists, entrepreneurs, motivational speakers, and community members, who shared their thoughts about remaining resilient, exploring personal and professional branding and life skills, and engaging in positive self-expression. Highlight: Charlotte's BLM Muralists joined our classes to discuss art and activism amid the summer protests over police brutality and racial injustice in the U.S.

Outreach Programs



HeART Packs

The HeART Pack outreach program provides art care packages to at-risk youth delivered to their homes. HeART Packs contain age-appropriate art supplies, educational games, comfort and creative toys, snacks, gift cards, and a message of hope. HeART Packs give the opportunity to explore creative outlets and positive self-expression, crucial to youth who cannot join TAEP's in-person programs. Schools, businesses and individuals collect supplies and assemble HeART Packs, involving the broader community in TAEP's work.

During the summer, individual sponsors signed up to create unique HeART Packs for students at Safe Alliance and Thompson Child and Family Focus. In total, we collected and distributed 77 HeART Packs filled with age-appropriate art supplies, toys, gifts, books, and snacks. During the winter holiday season, TAEP put together 300 Holiday HeART Packs for youth ages 5-18 at several partner agencies including Big Brothers Big Sisters, Safe Alliance, YFS, and Elon Homes.



Our Response To COVID-19



The pandemic created unique challenges for TAEP. As people around the world turned to the arts to foster resilience, promote connections and offer inspiration in 2020, The Arts Empowerment Project stepped up. Increasing our HeART Packs to reach isolated children meant sanitizing each delivery box from Amazon, fitting all volunteers with PPE and cleaning each separate item before placing it in the HeART Pack.

Pivoting our Encounters Life Skills Seminars and Promoting Peace + Justice Workshops to virtual platforms required hundreds of hours of work by all our staff and partners to become experts in Zoom, engage youth in meaningful virtual experiences, update our website to handle the traffic and re-imagine collaboration in an online environment. We are proud that our efforts allowed us to touch the lives of 513 children.


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

2021 Execution of Our Strategic Plan

As a result of the 2019 board retreat that focused on strategy, The Arts Empowerment Project Mission, Vision, & Goals have all been updated and better reflect the future of our organization. This strategic work also prioritized our four flagship and two outreach programs to enhance our impact in the community and elevate our mission to more broadly benefit all of the children who are impacted by violence and trauma each year.

MISSION: To break the cycles of violence and trauma through arts opportunities that ignite change in vulnerable youth.

VISION: A community that gives every child arts experiences that broaden horizons, foster resilience, and build essential life skills.

GOAL Pillars and Strategies

In order to significantly increase our service to the more than 18,000 Charlotte children and youth who are impacted by violence and trauma each year, TAEP and its board will focus on the following goal pillars:

- 1. Program development and growth
- 2. Branding and awareness
- 3. Organizational resilience
- 4. Financial sustainability

GOAL Strategies: Program development and growth

- Expand the number of students served through our current programs and services
- Deepen institutional partnerships for both program delivery and evaluation
- Grow programs that engage and serve caregivers and community members

GOAL Strategies: Branding and awareness

- Expand storytelling on digital platforms and social media
- Produce new storytelling content focused on students and impact
- Ensure consistent storytelling across stakeholders and platforms
- Create systems that capture and capitalize on data about our audiences, stakeholders and supporters

GOAL Strategies: Organizational resilience

- Define a long-term structural plan for staff roles, costs and locations
- Increase board continuity and confidence through strategic recruiting and succession planning
- Design and launch a program evaluation process that clarifies student outcomes and community impact

GOAL Strategies: Financial sustainability

- Develop a three-year framework for the growth and sourcing of TAEP's contributed revenues
- Increase board engagement in development efforts
- Increase multi-year corporate sponsorships
- Increase the quantity and retention of individual donors
- Upgrade the technology and data that support fundraising
