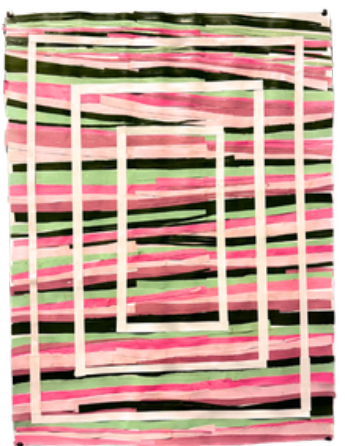

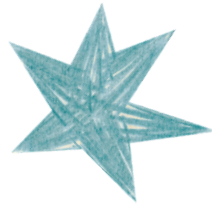

# MAKING A DIFFERENCE

## WHAT WE DO

The Arts Empowerment Project offers high-quality arts programming and social emotional development for at-risk children facing adversity. The programs integrate art instruction with life-skills development including communication, self-esteem, decision making, and more.

## WHY IT MATTERS

Participation in arts and positive pro-social activities has been shown to contribute to academic achievement and to mitigate the effects of childhood trauma, as demonstrated by an independent study of TAEP's pilot program by the UNC-Charlotte School of Social Work.

Students with access to the arts in high school are **THREE TIMES** more likely to earn a bachelor's degree than students without arts experience (17% vs. 5%)

Students with weekly exposure to the arts are **FOUR TIMES** more likely to be recognized in school for academic achievement

Students with little or no arts education are **FIVE TIMES** more likely to drop out of high school than students with high arts involvement

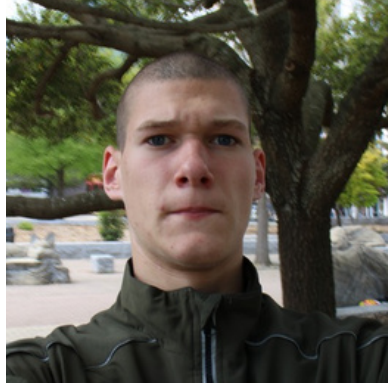

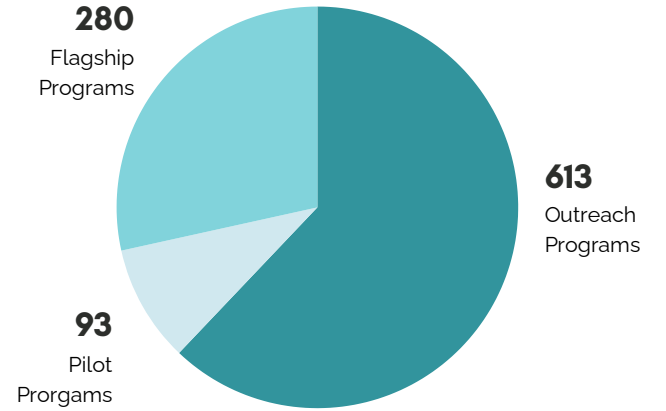

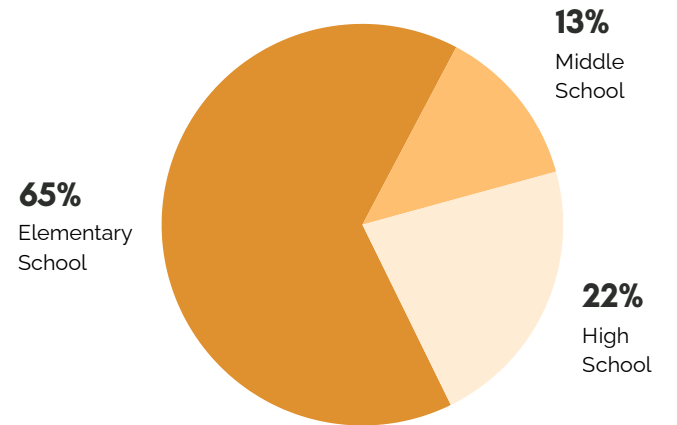

# OVERVIEW

“Our programs are designed to build a community that gives every child arts experiences that broaden horizons, foster resilience, and build essential life skills.”



## PROGRAMS

Grades 3 - 12 (Pilot Program)

### Arts Residency

A youth residency program that provides mentorship and classes with professional artists. Participants develop essential skills for various artistic careers. It covers interests in visual, digital, and performing arts, culminating in a group exhibit of participants' works.

Grades 6 - 12

### Culinary Arts

Led by professional chefs, this camp teaches court-involved teens about healthy eating and cooking skills. Participants explore career opportunities in the culinary arts.

Grades 6 - 12

### Encounters: Life Skills

This program promotes positive choices, self-awareness, and character development through art-making and discussions led by educators and guest artists.

Grades K - 5

### Free Arts

Students develop social and emotional skills through art, with opportunities to learn from local artists.

Grades 6 - 12

### Promoting Peace + Justice (PP+J)

At-risk teens come together with local law enforcement to challenge stereotypes, discuss community violence and promote social justice through collaborative art.

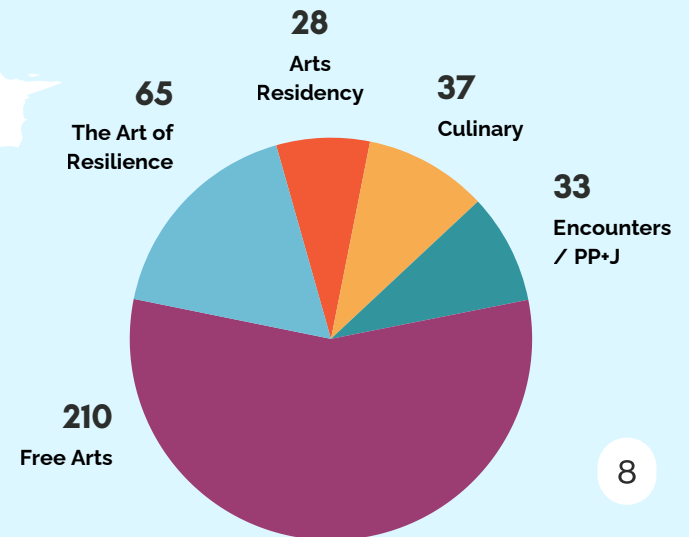
Grades 6 - 12 (Pilot Program)

## Arts Access

This initiative connects youth to meaningful arts experiences through tuition sponsorship for various activities. Participants engage with multiple arts organizations for interactive learning.

## Art Vocation Artist & Career Fair

This event immerses students in creativity and exploration by showcasing a diverse range of artists and entrepreneurs. Activities will encourage students to discover various creative fields and gain inspiration for their future endeavors.

## Facts & Snacks: Exploring the Art of Healing

For this special TAEP Event, we align ourselves with National Childhood Abuse Prevention Month (April) along with the Charlotte SHOUT festival to spread awareness through dialogue, performances and valuable statistics.

## HeART Packs

HeART Packs provides at-risk children with art care packages that include supplies and snacks, fostering creativity and positive self-expression.

## Mural Project

The “Breakthrough” mural is a collaborative community project, Created by Artist Makayla Binter & Local Students. The mural celebrates mental health, hope, and resilience. This project was in partnership with the SOC Collaborative of Mecklenburg, TYM, Alliance Health and the West Charlotte Rec Center.

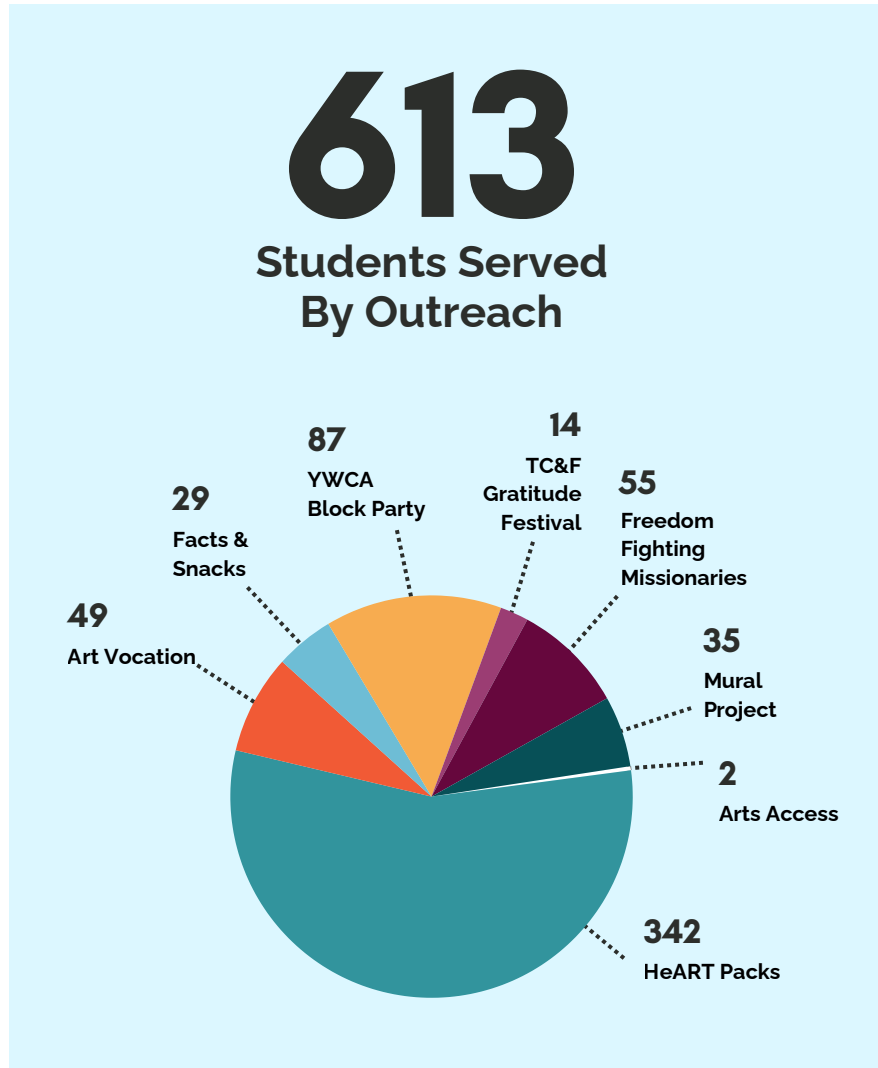

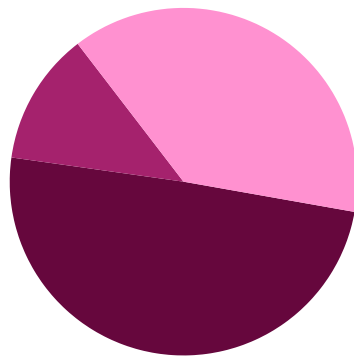

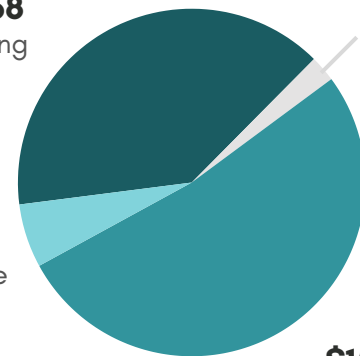
